SPEAKING OF SEX OFFENDERS: If you remember back in the Ex Alderman
Newsletter 279 on May 29th we reported that an Anthony Plectcher had been arrested
for exposing himself on the parking lot of Missouri Baptist Medical Center. Surveillance
video showed the pickup truck leaving the parking lot after the incident.



The driver of the truck was identified as Anthony Pletcher, 26, of Belleville, IL. After an investigation he was arrested and confessed to exposing himself to a female on the parking lot. He was released pending charges being issued by the County Prosecutor's Officer. On August 16 formal charges were issued against him. This is from the court files:

The Prosecuting Attorney of the County of St. Louis, State of Missouri, charges:

COUNT: 01 SEXUAL MISCONDUCT - 1ST DEGREE - 1ST OFFENSE - CLASS B MISDEMEANOR

That Anthony Pletcher, in violation of Section 566.093, RSMo, committed the class B Misdemeanor of Sexual Misconduct in the First Degree punishable upon conviction under Sections 566.093, 558.011 and 558.002, RSMo, in that on or about on or about May 11, 2017, in the County of St. Louis, State of Missouri, the defendant exposed his genitals under circumstances in which he knew that such conduct was likely to cause affront or alarm.

I, Ronnie Nicoletti, DSN 0110, Town and Country Police Department, knowing that false statements on this form are punishable by law, state that the facts contained herein are true. I have probable cause to believe that on May 11, 2017, at 3015 North Ballas Road, Anthony Pletcher, White, Male, DOB 10/11/1990, 6'00", 230lbs, committed one or more criminal offense(s).

Count: 01 SEXUAL MISCONDUCT - 1ST DEGREE - 1ST OFFENSE -

The facts supporting this belief are as follows:

Defendant called victim over to his truck while on the Missouri Baptist Hospital parking lot. When victim approached, defendant showed the victim his penis. Defendant turned himself in to police and confessed to exposing his penis.

CHESTERFIELD MAN, DRUNK, REFUSES BREATH TEST LEAVES TOWN AND COUNTRY COURTROOM WITH A NO-FINE, NO-POINTS DWI PROBATION. It was Saturday night into Sunday morning of Thanksgiving weekend 2016 when Garrett Gillman of 14306 Wainridge Drive in Chesterfield was driving his Subaru east on I-64 in Town and Country. Oh yeah, one other thing. He was drunk.

Cpl. McNutt of the T&C Police observed Gillman's silver Subaru Legacy weaving from lane to lane east on I-64 before I-270. Before Ballas Road Gillman weaved off the road onto the shoulder. Cpl. McNutt then stopped the car and contacted the drunk Gillman.

Cpl. McNutt asked for the Gillman's license, registration and proof of insurance. Gillman found his license and could not find his insurance card. He dumped the contents of his wallet into his lab. Cpl. McNutt could easily see a State Farm car insurance card, Gillman could not.

Gillman denied having anything to drink, but his front seat passenger told Cpl. McNutt that Gillman had something to drink. Gillman told Cpl. McNutt his contact lens wasn't in right. McNutt waited four or five minutes and Gillman could not put in his contact correctly.

Gillman's speech was slurred, his eyes were bloodshot, he swayed when standing and his breath had a strong odor of booze.

Two of the easier field sobriety tests Gillman did not just fail, he completely bombed.

He was asked to recite the alphabet beginning with the letter J and stopping at the letter W. Here is what he said, "J, F, K P."

He was then asked to try the alphabet from A-to-Z. He stated, " A, G...A,...F, , J. K. L, O, M, P, D, K."

He was then asked to count backwards from 57-to-42. He replied, "57...(pause) 45, 45...(another pause) 39." Cpl McNutt then stopped him.

After failing the balance tests and testing well over the limit on the field breath test, Gillman was arrested. At the police station he refused to take the official breath test or be interviewed.

He was released on citations for DWI and Improper Lane Use to his sober girlfriend.

Gillman's prior record shows that he was convicted in Boone County (Columbia, MO) in 2010 for an assault that occurred in 2009.

OUTCOME: On February 16, 2017 Gillman pled guilty to DWI and was given a No-Point, No-Fine, No-Record 2-year SIS probation term. He also pled guilty to Improper Lane Use and was fined \$225 which also carried 2-points.



Brinkman was at the Board of Aldermen Work Session before the regular meeting on August 14. There was a discussion over parking, as if too much land is being used for parking.

Brinkman also added that he did not know how much longer he could hold the restaurantuer’s attention as the Town Square planning process drags on.

SHOPLIFTER DOESN'T UNDERSTAND WHY SHE WAS ARRESTED: On December 15, 2015 at about 6:40pm Abigail Head, 22, of Ellisville was in Claire's Boutique in Chesterfield Mall. Prior to reaching Claire's she had been in Victoria's Secret and Toy Tyme.

She was observed shoplifting earrings by the manager of Claire's. At about the same time Chesterfield Police Officer Krumm a member of the retail squad that covers the mall and the stores in Chesterfield Valley was on foot patrol at the mall.

The manager of Claire's saw Officer McBride and contacted him saying the a woman had just shoplifted some earrings and she had been stopped after leaving the store. She pointed out Head, who was crying.

Officer Krumm contacted her. This is from his police report:

Head repeatedly asked if she could just pay for it. I explained she had that opportunity and we were now passed that point. Head then said "I have the money, I don't know why I stole it." I asked Head if she had her driver's license with her. Head said she did not have it as it was seized w

I then asked Head for her pedigree information. Head provided the information between sobs and repeatedly begged me not to arrest her and then said she "Would pay anything to not get arrested."

(The redacted section of the police report refers to Head DWI arrest and license seizure by the Ellisville Police.)

Head was arrested and then began to resist being handcuffed, by tightly grasping her hands together in front of her and struggling Officer Krumm's attempt to handcuff her hands behind her back. Despite her resisting Officer Krumm was able to handcuff her. This from the police report:

Head kept trying to pull her arm away from me and I held it in place. Head then turned her full body around and I told her to turn back around but she did not comply. While trying to pull away Head was crying and kept saying "I can't be arrested" and "Please don't arrest me". I then placed the first handcuff on her right wrist and stepped behind her pulling her arm behind her back and grabbed her left hand. Head tried to pull this hand away from me but I held it in place and secured the handcuffs to her left wrist. Head then began crying profusely but ceased resisting. I was able to check the handcuffs for proper fit and double-lock them at this time.

Once Head was handcuffed, officers checked her bags. They found a stuffed dog from Toy Tyme valued at \$5.99, a pair of red panties with white dots from Victoria's Secret valued at \$14.50 and the 3-pack of silver hoop earrings from Claire's valued at \$19.50. Her total haul was \$39.99.

Head told officers a friend who was not at the mall with her dared her to shoplift saying it would give her a rush.

Head was first taken to the mall's security office where a trespass order banning her from returning to the mall for a year was issued. Officer Krumm then began walking Head to his police car when she proved to be a slow learner. This from the police report:

I then escorted head to my patrol car, placed her in the rear passenger seat, and secured her with a seatbelt. While being placed in the car Head asked "Am I going to jail?" I told Head she was going to jail for stealing and resisting arrest. Head started crying again.

Once at the police station a video recorded statement was conducted where after being advised of her rights per the Miranda Ruling Head confessed again. She then gave a written statement. This again from the police report:

"I am so incredibly sorry for stealing tonight. I never want to do it again, nor have I done it before. I was looking for a rush to distract me from stresses in my life and had heard stealing was one. It definitely wasn't. Now I'm just more upset than before. Again, I am sorry for what I did. I feel humiliated and depressed about all of this."

Head was released on citations for Stealing and Resisting Arrest. Due to the latest of the hour the police then gave her a ride back to her car on the parking lot of Chesterfield Mall.

OUTCOME: On March 21, 2017 Chesterfield prosecuting attorney Tim Engelmeyer dismissed the Resisting Arrest charge and amended the Stealing charge to "Littering." Head was fined \$326.50 and ordered to pay \$26.50 in court costs.

PLANNING COMMISSION MEETING ON TRAILER PARK HAD ROOM FULL AS DEVELOPER 'S REP ANSWERED ACCESS QUESTIONS:

The council chambers were full with a SRO crowd for the start of the Planning Commission meeting on Monday August 14. The speakers for the most part tried their damndest to stay away from giving overtly emotional pleas.



George Stock, the consulting engineer representing the Florida developers that would like to purchase the property where the trailer park is, spoke first. Stock gave an update that was not much different than his first presentation.

The floor was then open to the public. Steve Robinson spoke first.

“I was told by a couple of councilmen to stick to the facts and not emotions,” said Robinson. He then quoted very vague guideline of the Planning Commission.

“Some of the goals of the Planning Commission are to preserve neighborhoods and preserve historic structures.” (Apparently he was trying to sell outdated and borderline unsafe 50-year-old mobile homes as “historic.”) Robinson added a goal of “encouraging diversity.”

Next up was James Moore, who said the situation was a “win-win-win” for the rights of the property owners and the needs of the residents. He suggested creating a Community Land Trust that would buy the property and eventually replace the trailers with “tiny houses.”

The Rev. Margaret Phillips, pastor of St. Thomas United Church of Christ, was unable not to bring emotion to the table.

“The city has not done anything in the past to provide low-income housing. The residents living in the trailer park cover jobs that no one else will do. How do we want to be known? As the exclusive uptight community or the one that opens its arms,” asked Pastor Phillips.

City Planner Jessica Henry spoke concerning the 11.73 acre mobile home park if turned into an apartment complex. She said the developer would agree to set aside 30 x 30 area for a grave site belonging to the Long family that dates back to 1800.

She said a billboard on the edge of the property facing I-64 is grandfathered in and is still under contract. It would remain at least until the end of the contract.

George Stock was then back for questioning on the design for the four building complex with a population of over 200,



The plan only has a garage for 25 cars. Planning commissioner Wendy Gekler wanted to know what Stock was talking about when he said “exceptional design” with cars parked all over the place.

Stock said the “exceptional design” was the architecture. He was then asked why there wasn’t underground parking. He replied they could not have underground parking due to flood plan issues. (Of course this begs the question as to why would anyone want to develop this piece of property.)

Stock was then asked how the complex was going to fit in with the historic district just to the west.

“We looking at a design that is a flavor of Colorado,” said Stock.


My question is: To get that flavor of Colorado will the apartment management be making snow all winter long?

CITY COUNCIL APPROVED CONSTRUCTION TO CLOSE RIVER VALLEY ROAD AT THE MARYLAND HEIGHTS CITY LIMITS: Over 100 residents from the River Bend subdivision were at the City Council meeting to watch the Council approve a \$178,000 expenditure to build the closure of River Valley Road.

The road, a narrow winding road goes through the center of the subdivision, passing the River Bend Elementary School near Olive Blvd., going past houses, a couple of traffic slowing roundabouts then turning into a twisting winding road down a steep hill.





At the bottom of the hill is the Maryland Heights City Limits and the Howard Bend flood plain. The City of Maryland Heights had rezoned the area from ag to industrial, commercials, multifamily housing and single family housing. McBride and Sons was going to be one of the developers. Estimates of the amount of traffic using the road from subdivision and school traffic are around 1,000 cars a day increasing to close to 13,000 cars a day if the development is completed. River Valley connects the Howard Bend area with a main thoroughfare of Olive Blvd.

Three years ago the residents with the help of Councilwoman and former mayor Nancy Greenwood had a plan to close the road. Greenwood died of cancer, but her replacement Barb McGuinness and longtime councilman Barry Flachsbart both live in the subdivision and pushed the plan along.

The city council had approved a closure plan with the subdivision donating some common ground to the cul-de-sac at the closure. However one resident, Andy Shanfeld, threatened to sue claiming not all subdivision property owners (especially him) had given permission to give away the land.

It was back to the drawing board. The original cost estimate to shut down the road in 2015 was \$154,962. The new plans included one private property owner donating some land, but the cost estimates rose to \$245,000. However, when the property owner donated land the costs estimate dropped to \$203,000. They would soon drop more.

The low bid for the project which was accepted came in at \$165,609 and with a cost overrun contingency it came to \$178,000. This was approved on an 8-0 vote. Construction could start as early as September.

Recently McBride and Sons pulled out of the Maryland Heights project. However, the rezoning has occurred and the land is still ripe from development. Traffic however will not come off Olive Blvd down River Valley Drive to reach the area.

CBIZ REPORT STILL NOT ACCEPTED. The CBIZ report that contains recommendations for Chesterfield city employee salaries and benefits has still not been approved to be use. At the August 7 meeting Barry Flachsbart made a motion to accept the report and did not receive a second.

At the August 21st meeting Flachsbart again made a motion for the city to accept the report and to bring up the employee's pay to the 75% level as indicated in the report of cities and private businesses.

This vote was a 4-4 tie. Flachsbart, Randy Logan, Guy Tilman and Dan Hurt voted for it. Tom DeCampi, Michelle Ohley, Ben Keathley and Barb McGuinness voted against it. Mayor Bob Nation broke the tie by going with the "No" votes.

FLACHSBART AND LOGAN CLAIMS COUNCIL SHOWS THEY HATE EMPLOYEES: Both Flachsbart and Randy Logan claimed the council was sending a negative message to the employees of what the council thinks of them.

In response to Flachsbart and Logan Councilman Tom DeCampi said at one point, "Sure, let's pass a plan when we don't know what's in it."

Misinformation: In describing the employees who were in the 50% pay and benefit level of other affluent cities several times staff and some elected members have inferred that the only people affected are lower wage laborers. That is not true as some white collar middle management folks are also in between the 50% and 75% pay levels.

After much discussion and debate a motion was made to send the report to staff to review and possibly define certain sections and then send them to the Finance and

Administration Committee and the Council as a Whole. This means it be will at the committee level, but the entire council can attend and vote on it instead of just four members. If it passes it would then go to the same eight people at a city council meeting.

Our review of the report found that it was confusing and never in simple terms showed which Chesterfield employees were affected and where their pay and benefits fell in the comparasions. Often you have to keep going back to Chesterfield pay schedules and the flip many pages ahead to see exactly where they were.

Councilman Dan Hurt wanted this to be at the very next F&A meeting; however the majority wanted the staff to have a more a reasonable amount of time to do their work. They prevailed. Look for this to come back in October.

CLASSIC CAR STOLEN: Although I doubt it is still in the area, here is a BOLO (police talk for Be On Look Out). A classic 1965 Ford Mustang was reported stolen on August 17th from the covered parking area of the Westmount Apartments in the 1300 block of Westmeade Drive.



FLORIDA MAN ON A MISSION FROM GOD STOPS AT CITY COUNCIL TO TALK ABOUT ART: Prior to the August 7 City Council meeting, the reporters were banished from the Agenda Review meeting as the council went into a secret executive session. We were in the regular council chambers waiting for the start of the regular meeting when Paul Douglas Wislowski of Largo, Florida entered the room and took center stage of the empty room.

Wislotki claims to be on a Mission of God to create community art work to send to troops or distressed cities. Wislotki will put up a canvass at a public gathering and invite people to put art on it.

The last page of the copies was his rambling mission statement in small font that was several hundred words long.

The first sentence of the first paragraph read: "The story of my life really started when I got shot at by a policeman for \$10 worth of marijuana back in 1979."

The lead sentence of the second paragraph was: "In 1980 I met this girl that I though(t) loved me. She had this other guy living with her and things got complicated."

The lead of the seventh and final paragraph of his mission statement was, "My life has been to make moments for the people that cross my path."

He signed the statement "Jesus Bless you, Paul Douglas Wislotki, Christian Missionary of Art."

THE NEW MONARCH FIRE BOARD'S FIRST PUBLIC MEETING: The new Monarch Fire Protection Board with elected directors, Robin Harris, Rick Gans and newly appointed member Jeannine Millner held their first open meeting on Thursday August 17.



Sometimes you really have to search for something to write about at a Monarch meeting. However there were two items of interest.

Director Robin Harris suggested when the 2-man rescue truck was available that it be sent on an ambulance call instead of a 3 or 4-man pumper. His theory was it would keep a pumper crew in service, which could respond to another EMS call in the immediate area and reduce wear and tear on pumper trucks since the rescue truck is smaller. The two man rescue crew could offer plenty of assistance to the ambulance crew.

Having once worked a fatal car-fire truck crash where a teenage girl with a Queen tape playing full blast (have I dated this to the early 1980s?) was broadsided by a pumper truck responding to another accident call, I'm all in favor in running as few pieces of large fire equipment as possible. However the problem with this plan is that there is only one rescue truck in the entire district and it might have to go much further distance than a nearby pumper. However any modification of the plan would be good news.

The next item that I found interesting was that Chief Carey Spiegel asked for a Request For Proposal (Bids) for a new utility truck to replace Truck 2299. That vehicle is a 18-year old 1999 Dodge pickup truck. It is currently used as a snow plow in the winter. However they don't want to get rid of the truck.

The snow plow blade will not fit on newer trucks, so they want a new pickup truck to be used year-round on maintenance jobs but that can also plow snow and keep the 1999 Dodge so they can remove snow faster from engine houses with two trucks.

NAME PLATE FOR FIRE CHIEF: With Chief Chuck Marsonette still on paid suspension while he faces 13 felony charges in connection with fraud at his former employer, former assistant chief Carey Spiegel has been the acting chief. (Marsonette has court appearances scheduled on 09/21/17 for four of the charges and on 09/28/17 on nine other charges, plus a future court date in Federal Court on a civil suit by his former employer Reliant Care of Maryland Heights.)

While he is technically the Interim Fire Chief, Spiegel's name plate is now at the fire chief's chair. For a year Spiegel's name was not in front of his seat on the dais. It is now. Now they need to get Ast. Chief Les Crews a name plate on the dais. Marsonette's contract with the Fire District expires on December 31.



But in recent attempts to have really good Baby Back Ribs that failed, I asked the waiter to be a consultant. He assured me the baby back ribs at BrickTops were great.



We also do some entertainment stories, local elections, restaurant reviews plus editorials, especially about the corrupt Municipal Court system .



Then suddenly from Dean, backed up by Chris Swan on the keyboards, was this, “You want More? Okay.


